Michael E. Lamb, Ph.D.

Michael E. Lamb, Ph.D. is internationally recognized for his fundamental contributions to our knowledge of early family relationships and child care, and for his groundbreaking work at the intersection of developmental science and public policy. His scholarship has significantly advanced developmental psychology, and had a major impact on legal authorities, forensic investigators, policymakers, and others concerned with the well-being of children. Dr. Lamb is a Professor of Psychology in the Social Sciences, Head, Department of Social and Developmental Psychology, Faculty of Politics, Psychology, Sociology, and International Studies, at Cambridge University in the United Kingdom, where he has been since 2004. Dr. Lamb received a Bachelor's degree in psychology and economics from the University of Natal in Durban, South Africa (1972), Master's degrees in psychology from Johns Hopkins University (1974) and Yale University (1975), a Master's degree in philosophy from Yale University (1975), and a Ph.D. in psychology from Yale University (1976). He has held academic positions as Assistant Professor of Psychology at the University of Wisconsin, Assistant Professor of Psychology at the University of Michigan, and Professor of Psychology, Psychiatry, and Pediatrics at the University of Utah. From 1987 until 2004, he was head of the Section on Social and Emotional Development and a Senior Research Psychologist at the United States National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD), an institute within the National Institutes of Health (NIH). He has also served as a visiting professor at Universities around the world, including Japan, Germany, Israel, and Yale University School of Medicine.

More than 33 research grants have been awarded to Dr. Lamb, and he has been principal or co-investigator on 28. Currently, he is the co-investigator on the following research grants: "Parenting and the psychological development of children in gay father families" (The Economic and Social Research Council), and "Children's evidence in criminal proceedings" (Nuffield Foundation Conference Grant). He has served as an Ad Hoc Grant Proposal Reviewer for twelve foundations and government agencies in the United States, Australia, New Zealand, and Canada; including the Carnegie Foundation, NIMH, and the National Science Foundation. He has also served as a Conference Review Panel member for eight different organizations, including the American Psychological Association (APA), American-Psychology-Law Society Convention, and many international conferences. Twenty six professional committees from the United States,

Israel, Germany, Cameroon, United Kingdom, and Austria have benefitted from his leadership and service. These include the APA, The American Society of Professionals on the Abuse of Children (APSAC), and the National Fatherhood Initiative. His service to universities, institutions, and communities has been a constant throughout his career and he has held leadership roles at many of these organizations. When Dr. Lamb received the Certificate of Merit for Outstandingly Good Work in Psychology and Economics, University of Natal in 1971, it was the first of many honors and distinctions recognizing his research, publication, and advocacy efforts, and in 2003 he received the James McKeen Cattell Fellow Award for Lifetime Achievement from the American Psychological Society.

Over the past 35 years, Dr. Lamb has pursued two broad areas of research: (1) Forensic issues, such as the credibility of children and the best ways of eliciting accurate information from victims of child abuse, and (2) Children's development and adjustment, especially the formative effects of the relationships that children establish with their parents and the ways in which these relationships shape children's development over time. He has examined factors that are likely to have an adverse effect on development, such as child abuse, and explored variations in rearing experiences that might affect child development, such as the effects of various types of nontraditional family forms and other childcare settings.

Dr. Lamb's initial research in the United States was about the formation of relationships between infants and their parents in "traditional" households with a mother and a father. He first focused on the role played by fathers in children's development and later expanded his research in order to better understand the complete role that fathers play in children's lives – whether they live with their children or not, and when they are highly involved or uninvolved in childcare. He has provided expert testimony in a number of recent trials in support of "nontraditional" parents. His first publication concerning Forensic Interviewing was in 1993, a chapter "Interviewing young victims of child maltreatment" in M. Hovav (Ed.), *Sexual abuse of children: The law, investigator, and the court* (pp. 109-131). Tel Aviv, Israel: Shirikova Publishers. (Translated into Hebrew for publication.)

Dr. Lamb has authored over 500 publications that have appeared either in peer-reviewed professional journals or in professional books published by academic presses. He has written or edited more than 45 books in the field of developmental psychology, development in infancy, mother-child relationships, father-child relationships, the role of the father, sibling relationships,

the effects of nontraditional rearing circumstances, the effects of child daycare, child abuse, and forensic interview practices. Many of his books are used widely as texts in graduate courses across a variety of disciplines. He has been a peer-reviewer for 25 various professional journals for over 30 years, currently averaging two reviews per week. Currently, he is on the Editorial Board for the journals *Applied Cognitive Psychology*; *Applied Developmental Science*; *Developmental Review*; *Fathering*; *Infant Behavior and Development*; *Journal of Adolescent Research*; *Journal of Child Custody; Psychology, Public Policy, and Law*; *Social Development*, and he has been the Associate Editor of *Child Abuse and Neglect* since 2005. He is also an Editorial Consultant for 27 other scholarly journals and a Publication Reviewer for 16 academic presses.

Scope

Below is the most comprehensive and current open-access bibliography of the published works of Michael E. Lamb, Ph.D. It is divided into two sections, Child Development and Forensic Interviewing of Children. Each section is arranged in descending chronological order, and alphabetized by year... There are a few items which could have been placed into either section, and this certainly would have been the case had further categorization been attempted. All reprints are listed with the citation of the original article or book chapter. While every effort was made to locate all of Dr. Lamb's publications, due to his extensive authorship, and the fact that many of his works have been translated into several languages, there may be some omissions. Publications covered are from years 1973 to 2014.

The following databases were utilized in the production of this Bibliography: APA PsycNET, PubMed, EBSCO's Psych/Behavioral and SOC Index, ERIC, and LexisNexis. Also utilized were Dr. Lamb's Curriculum Vitae from NIH (retrieved from http://www.psychology.sunysb.edu/attachment/vitae/lamb_cv.pdf); his academic profile from the University of Cambridge Department of Social and Developmental Psychology (retrieved from <http://www.sdp.cam.ac.uk/contacts/staff/profiles/mlamb.html>), and his qualifications for consideration as an expert witness in the affidavit from the following court case: *Windsor v.
